Sister Janet became program director of the radio station and remained there 25 years. With the exception of two years, Sister Janet has been a permanent resident of Guatemala. Those two were spent getting her master's degree at Gonzaga University in Spokane and one year teaching at DeSales High School in Walla Walla, Washington. From 1992 to 2010 she was the coordinator of educational television/radio/media in Quiche, Guatemala. In 1991, Sister Janet received the rarely bestowed Papal Cross, the Vatican's highest recognition of a lay person who spreads the Gospel. She is living in retirement in Guatemala City.

God's call came and went from the time I was in the second grade. My decision to enter was definitely influenced by the School Sisters of Notre Dame who taught me from first grade through high school.

I have been blessed with the support of family, friends and companions all through my life.
