Walking with God

"I see spiritual direction as a very special friendship in my life. Where else can I go or whom else can I talk to about my relationship with God and be assured that they will openly, whole-heartedly listen to me? I appreciate having someone to whom I can express who God is for me and how this continually plays out in my life." ~ Jean

Since the early 1970s, many School Sisters of Notre Dame have embraced God's call to become spiritual directors. In this ministry, they provide spiritual direction, retreats, programs and pastoral support designed to connect individuals and groups with their deepest spiritual values







and motivations. Spiritual direction is an opportunity to speak about life in an intimate way with the focus on the person's religious experience: the quality of important relationships, the attitude toward work or career, hopes and worries, struggles and goals, joyful memories and regrets.

Sister Rosemary Schwalbe shares her thoughts on spiritual direction: "The Spirit is at work before, during and after our session. As spiritual directors, we are the ones who need open hearts and spirits to notice that work.

"Some persons will come with a list of concerns. Some come not knowing what they are going to say," Sister Rosemary continues. "Either way, the Spirit is present guiding each of us to say what needs to be said. We need to listen carefully but we are not there to solve their problems. We are there to support and encourage their relationship with the All Merciful One."

"Over the last 10 years, I have experienced deep darkness in my life, but I could always know that for that one hour a month my spiritual director would remind me how God was with me in my state of hopelessness, that I was not alone. She would bring a perspective of faith to my situation to help me see I had the strength to survive, that I would never be abandoned and I was surrounded by love." ~ Jean




In the early 1970s, Sister Joanne Dehmer was invited by the community to receive training in spiritual direction. "The call to become a spiritual director first came from the community. In the midst of studying and preparing, I came to discern it was God's call for me to enter this ministry."

Sister Joanne began spiritual direction and retreat ministry in 1974. She had been a teacher, then served as director of pastoral care ministry in parishes. For many years, part of her job description included spiritual direction and retreat ministry. Sister Joanne currently is a full-time spiritual director and retreat minister at Loyola Spirituality Center in St. Paul, Minn.



"As a spiritual director, I witness the mystery of God's presence in another's life, holding hope for those who struggle to find hope and meaning in their lives. I listen to the myriad ways God is manifest in the person's life and how God might be inviting this person to healing and forgiveness and the discovery of their own goodness. I wait with people as they discern the next steps in their life. I hear the joys and the daily call to be faithful in the ordinary days of life."

Sister Joanne reflects: "Through spiritual direction and retreat ministry, I become more aware of God's presence in my life, and I am called to fidelity to my own spiritual path. I am both humbled and honored to give witness to another's sacred story."



St. Mary of the Pines Retreat Center in Chatawa, Miss., lies midway between Jackson, Miss., and New Orleans, La. What a spiritual impact the School Sisters of Notre Dame have had on the great number of participants served at this retreat center since it opened in 1988.

In earlier times, the Choctaw Native Americans inhabited this land, followed by the Redemptorist Fathers. Realizing the land was not suitable for their needs, the Redemptorists invited School Sisters from Milwaukee to open a boarding school for girls on the 300-acre campus. In 1879 the Redemptorists sold the property to the School Sisters for \$9,000. Over the next 100 years, this purchase by Mother Caroline proved to be a remarkably wise decision. What began as a thriving boarding school became an aspiranture for young girls considering religious life, and finally has become a retirement home for sisters and the retreat center.

Because of location, the retreat center is protected from the activities of city life. The outdoors are conducive to the peace and tranquility needed for reflective time. Ample space includes a cosmic walk through the woods, an outdoor way of the cross, a labyrinth and a small lake.

The retreat center, a three-story residence and formerly the sisters' convent, was renovated to accommodate 60 guests. The center includes a reflective chapel, library and rooms for spiritual direction. Large porches with rockers add to the comfortable Southern ambiance. Two hermitages were built in 1997. To meet retreatants' physical limitations, accessible, private bathrooms will be added to seven guest rooms this August.

Several sisters staff the St. Mary of the Pines Retreat Center with warm southern hospitality. Sister Helen Roper is the director of the center and responsibly provides for the needs of each group from registration to departure. Sister Dorez Mehrtens is the resident director of private retreats.

The sisters and staff strive to make Christ visible by their very being, sharing their faith, hope, love and the natural beauty of Chatawa with all.



Themed retreats are also popular and include quilt-making, icon writing and painting. Those who come acknowledge they are on holy ground.

Many have spoken of the peaceful atmosphere of St. Mary of the Pines. Recently a retreatant wrote, "I love coming here for retreat because it gives me another opportunity to be with the sisters. An added advantage is the wooded setting because it allows me to absorb nature as I walk the property." After a time of renewal, another guest commented, "As always it was a time of peace, quiet and prayer: a true mountain top experience. I deeply need the affirmation God offers me when I am here, so I look forward to future visits."

CELEBRATING A CENTURY ON THE HILL



School Sisters of Notre Dame from the Milwaukee Province arrived in Mankato, Minn., in 1865 to staff a school at SS. Peter and Paul Parish. This foundation became a center for dozens of sisters who were sent to establish schools in 25 towns in central and southern Minnesota.

In 1910, the sisters, encouraged and supported by leaders in the Mankato community, broke ground for a motherhouse and an academy for girls on Good Counsel Hill, which opened in the fall of 1912. This was made possible by generous donations from Mankato citizens.

The Hill has been, and continues to be, a center of PRAYER. Daily celebration of Eucharist, community and personal prayer are at the heart of the life of the sisters. They make the needs and concerns of the world their own and are often blessed by members of the broader community who join in worship.

The PRESENCE of School Sisters of Notre Dame has been a continuous gift to those who experience the warmth and welcome, the peacefulness, prayerfulness, beauty and sacredness of the Hill.

Wherever School Sisters are present, they endeavor to foster unity as they gather with others who join them in prayer, ministry, care of the earth and in promoting justice and peace. Since 1987 the Hill has been a designated peace site. More recently, a Peace Pole has been erected where prayers for world peace are held monthly on the 11th.

The SERVICE of the School Sisters of Notre Dame reaches out from the Hill and embraces the needs locally and beyond. Service has been mutually enriching for all who have been a part of our ministries.

The century of EDUCATION on the Hill has been and continues to be directed toward the transformation of the world through the transformation of persons. Together, we help each other reach the fullness of our potential and direct our gifts toward building the earth.



The Hill is presently home to Loyola Catholic School; In My Vision, a wood sculpture studio; conference center; Sacred Space ministry; Center for Earth Spirituality and Rural Ministry; community gardens; Foot Reflexology; several artists and centers for crafts and ceramics; and the Learning Center with its outreach to students of all ages and nationalities, including many immigrants.

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

On June 3, the School Sisters of Notre Dame will bid farewell to Our Lady of Mount Carmel Convent in Mount Calvary, Wis., with a Mass and open house. Friends and neighbors are invited to help the sisters celebrate 160 years of the abundant blessings God has provided at Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

Established in 1852 by Mother Caroline Friess, the convent became the first SSND branch house west of the Allegheny Mountains when Novice Petra Forreria and Candidate Frances Mueller were missioned by Mother Caroline Friess to teach at the Carmel school.

For almost 100 years, the convent complex grew – adding buildings and barns to create a working farm that provided sustenance for the sisters. Because of the invigorating air of the Wisconsin countryside, the convent became a home for retired sisters. Most recently, the property of 36 acres of farmland was the first site for Sunseed Eco-Education Ministries.

After studying the buildings' possibilities, looking at the property's safety and maintenance issues and considering the decreasing number of sisters living at Mount Carmel, the decision was made to sell the property.

Leaving Mount Carmel is hard, but the memories will remain in our hearts as we heed Blessed Theresa Gerhardinger's words, "We have no lasting dwelling here; our true homeland is heaven."



In the spirit of our understanding of education, International Women's Day in March was an occasion to formally honor women in leadership with events in Milwaukee, Wis., and St. Louis, Mo. Luncheons offered women leaders of all ages the opportunity to reflect on the integration of the spiritual and professional dimensions of leadership.

Dr. Eileen Schwalbach, President of Mount Mary College in Milwaukee, spoke to 125 participants on the Notre Dame of Elm Grove Campus. She centered her comments on the theme of "Educating to Transform the World."

In St. Louis, Maureen Hermann, President of Marian Middle School, addressed 80 attendees. The concert was presented by bassoonist Dr. Christin Schillinger and pianist Jed Moss who generously donated their performance. Dr. Schillinger is the Assistant Professor of Bassoon at Miami University, Ohio. Jed Moss, a collaborative musician and soloist, has performed with musicians from the nation's top orchestras.
