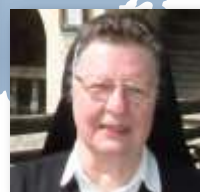
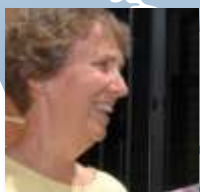

In mission 185 years, School Sisters of Notre Dame have responded to urgent needs, directing their entire lives for that oneness for which Christ was sent. As we mark this anniversary of the founding of our congregation on October 24, I am delighted to introduce our newsletter *In Mission*. This is a new collaborative initiative of our international, multicultural, multilingual congregation.

The congregation has grown since its humble beginnings in Bavaria, Germany in 1833, when three young women began to live community life, dedicated to addressing the needs of their times through education. Urged by deep faith and courage, our founder Blessed M. Theresa Gerhardinger risked meager resources to respond wherever she was called. In her spirit, we discern and respond to God's call expressed in our times. Today, diverse in background, culture, and language, we live and serve in 30 countries on five continents, united in mission.

Especially sensitive to youth, women, and those who struggle with injustice and poverty, we educate with the conviction that the world can be changed through the transformation of persons. As educators in all that we are and do, we recognize our obligation and opportunities to develop a world vision and a sense of global responsibility.

Communion with the Triune God impels each of us into the heart of the world to transform it with peace, hope, and love. May these stories of our life in mission inspire and give witness to God's universal love, love that gives everything.

Transform lives, transform the world

The Caroline Center, named after Mother Caroline Friess, is an education and career skills training center for women sponsored by the Atlantic-Midwest Province of the School Sisters of Notre Dame. It is located in Baltimore, Maryland, United States of America.

Caroline Center's 15-week programs train women for employment as nursing assistants or pharmacy technicians. The programs are scholarship-based, tuition-free and offered three times a year. Students must meet certain qualifications and successfully complete an interview before being accepted. Last year the Center implemented an online application; 880 women applied for the 90 available slots.

Additional life-skills education sets the Center apart. There is also a strong emphasis on job placement; students have the opportunity to do clinical rotations during their training. Caroline Center recently added an academic and career advancement program to encourage graduates to advance their careers.

The goals of Caroline Center have remained consistent over the years. "We have always looked for where the jobs are, with good pay and room for advancement," says Sister Patricia McLaughlin, SSND. Sister Pat recently retired after 22 years as Director of Caroline Center. Under her guidance, the program's focus shifted with the changing needs of the times from teaching women manual skills such as upholstery to preparing them for careers in the healthcare sector. As a result, thousands of women, including approximately 6,000 during Sister Pat's time, have passed through Caroline Center and on to a better future.

Meeting needs in a changing world

Good Counsel Learning Center in Mankato, Minnesota, United States of America, completed 51 years of one-to-one tutoring of children and adults. Originally named the Reading Center, the focus in 1967 was on improving literacy among children. Over the years, other subjects were added, and we began to tutor adults.

At first, the majority of tutors were School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSNDs) who tutored after a full day of teaching or during their summer vacation; lay teachers were hired as needed. Today, tutors include semi-retired SSNDs who appreciate the opportunity to use their energy and years of classroom experience.

In the past 10 years, the Center clientele has expanded as the people and needs have changed. Today, Somali, Sudanese and Vietnamese families add a new dimension to the Center and to the Our Lady of Good Counsel community. The immigrant students share their community with us through their dress, food and culture. We recognize anew the charism of Mother Theresa who brought Sisters to the United States to teach the children of German immigrants. We are honored to continue in her footsteps.

Lessons learned while educating boys

Svetits Institute is our 122-year-old school in the Hungarian Province, in Debrecen, Hungary. Before 2012, it was a girls-only school. We now also educate boys at our kindergarten and primary school, as well as at our high school.

In 2012, at the age of 50, I embarked upon the education of a class of boys and girls following the educational principles of Mother Theresa: high standards, motivating teaching methods, personal attention, love, understanding, acceptance, and close contact with parents.

I cannot claim that everything went as expected; however, the experience has been one of the most beautiful gifts of my service as a teacher.

What did I learn during the past six years?

1. Boys and girls are able to create real community, a true model of unity in diversity.
2. The emotional world of boys is as complicated as that of girls.
3. The different capacities and interests of the sexes need different programs.
4. Ongoing learning and methodological renewal is an obligation.
5. Humor is a great means of education.

Six years ago the Lord called me to educate boys along with girls. I am grateful for this call! I have been enriched.

Inclusion of persons with disabilities

The School Sisters of Notre Dame began the "Rumo Norte" Project in 2002, with the goal of professionalizing and empowering people with disabilities. The Project is located in the heart of Porto Alegre, Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil.

The General Coordinator is Sister Dulce Maria Boniatti, SSND. She is assisted by Ms. Liziane Silva who coordinates the various pedagogical aspects of the Project.

Rumo Norte offers 43 workshops, including braille, Spanish, handicrafts, computing, art, massage therapy, dance, theater, and posture rehabilitation. There are also groups such as a women's group and a therapeutic group.

Approximately 193 people, the majority of whom are blind, make use of the Rumo Norte project services.

The sisters and staff have created a welcoming atmosphere at Rumo Norte. It is a safe environment where each person feels at home with oneself and with others.

Since 1849, School Sisters have lived and worked in Birkenstein, an important pilgrimage place in Bavaria, Germany. Mother Theresa herself founded this mission. When the grade school was transferred to a larger town in 1966, the mission of Birkenstein changed.

Since then, pilgrimages are our focus. Our ministry now is that of sacristan. We sisters are responsible for the chapel and the environment of the pilgrimage place. What is unique about our service as sisters? Where and how are we “in the heart of the world”?

With our religious habit, we are known immediately as sisters. We are approachable “all the time”, not only during “office hours”. We are asked to pray for all intentions. However, not only petitions come to us; we also hear about answers to prayer. Pilgrims feel the need to share and speak about what they have experienced.

During my 30 years as sacristan, my service has included the chapel tour. People often ask for an explanation; they leave with an understanding of the theological and spiritual richness of our chapel.

It is the best service that the congregation could have given me: to be sacristan at Birkenstein, in the “heart of the world”.

Education provides access to the world

Founded 32 years ago, Notre Dame School in Bandipur, Nepal began with 50 students in a goat shed. Today, the school has 820 students. The school’s success is partially based upon the emphasis on inclusion; almost half of the students are female. Many students have gone on to graduate from universities around the world.

Sister Barbara Soete has taught in Nepal since 2006. She chose to minister in the small, remote village of Bandipur after hearing stories from her sibling, Sister Andre Maureen Soete, who served in Japan for many years and had spent a year in Nepal. “It was a place of great need,” said Sister Barbara.

Sisters share their faith if asked, but their faith is primarily expressed by the way they live; education is their top priority.

“We take poor children who would have no choice but to accept work as manual laborers in a limited environment and we give them access to higher learning across Nepal and the world,” said Sister Barbara. “That’s amazing.”

Creating a loving home

Our “Wiosna” (“Spring”) Children’s Home in Krzydłina Mała in the south-west part of Poland celebrates its 75th anniversary this year.

Five School Sisters of Notre Dame and 48 qualified lay staff ensure 24-hour care. They provide a nurturing atmosphere for children who have been abandoned in hospitals or deprived of parental care.

For these children, the sisters and staff are like mothers, accompanying them in getting to know the world and educating them. All this is done in the spirit of Mother Theresa.

Since the opening of the house in 1943, we have provided care for more than 3,476 children (about 46 each year). 924 of these children have found a home with loving families.
