Following a sabbatical in 1997, she returned to Missouri and served for more than a decade in Hispanic ministries at parishes in Webb City, Carthage, and Columbia. There in our school, I saw and felt our charism come alive! I learned how poor people can be some of the most generous people I have met. I learned how to laugh at myself when I made cultural and verbal "bloopers." I grew in simplicity and gratitude for all God's gifts.

School Sisters of Notre Dame were my teachers at my girls' high school in St. Louis, Rosati-Kain. They were excellent teachers, and I loved to learn from them, to be around them.
