ister Virginia's years in ministry began with teaching posts in Quincy, Illinois and St. Louis, Missouri. From 1974-1979, she served in religious education at St. Joseph School in Farmington, Missouri, and the next six years in elementary school administration in Herrin, Illinois. In 1985, she returned to teaching in Fort Madison, Iowa. Beginning in 1994, she ministered there for a decade as director of religious education at four area schools. Following a sabbatical and short assignments in St. Louis and Burlington, Iowa, as a pastoral minister, she answered a call to serve on the congregational leadership team in the former St. Louis Province. Since 2012, she has served in parish ministry at Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church in Lake Ozark, Missouri. She received a bachelor's in American studies from the former Notre Dame College in St. Louis and a master's of religious studies from Barry University in Miami, Florida.
