ister Mary Jane's initial years in ministry were teaching grade school in Missouri at St. Peter School, Jefferson City and St. Martin of Tours, St. Louis. From the late 1960s through 1988, she worked as school administrator at St. Martin of Tours, St. Martins; St. Mary, Cape Girardeau; St. Joseph, Westphalia and St. Anthony, Effingham, Illinois; and as assistant superintendent of schools for the Diocese of Springfield/ Cape Girardeau. She served as pastoral associate from 1988-1996 at St. John Parish, Leopold, Missouri and from 1996-1999 at St. Mary Parish, Johnson City, Tennessee after which she shifted to the position of administrator at St. Mary's School from 1999-2001. Sister Mary Jane returned to Missouri, as a teacher at Guardian Angel School in Oran, 2001-2004 and then served the parish as director of religious education, 2004-2012. Since 2012, she has devoted herself as a witness to God's love and presence at the Veronica House in Bridgeton. She holds a bachelor's in English from the former Notre Dame College in St. Louis; a master's in elementary administration from Southeast Missouri State University in Cape Girardeau and a master's in pastoral studies from Loyola University in New Orleans.
