Beginning in 1970, she served a three-year term as a provincial councilor in Mequon, Wisconsin, then returned to the classroom for three more years in Marshfield, also in Wisconsin. From 1976-1984, she served in administration at Notre Dame Health Care Center in Elm Grove, Wisconsin. She ministered as a secretary for 14 years at Milwaukee's Maryhill Retirement Center, after which she pursued numerous volunteer and part-time ministries across Milwaukee. She now resides in prayer and presence at our Lady of the Angels convent in Greenfield, Wisconsin. She earned a bachelor's in history from Mount Mary College in Milwaukee.

A blessing of these years I want to share is ...
