ister Miriam spent more than two decades as a teacher in nine different Catholic schools across the Minnesota communities of St. Paul, Loretto, Northfield, Mankato and Lismore, and in the North Dakota town of Dickinson. From 1970-1971 she served in Winona, Mankato and Hampton, Minnesota, then returned to teaching in Litomysl and Wells. She accepted a two-year teaching assignment in Cresco, Iowa, before turning to ministry in art therapy for students with special needs. She served in the Minnesota towns of Northfield and Robbinsdale, as well as St. Louis, Chicago and Freeport, Illinois, and Philadelphia. In the mid 1990s, she became director of Expressive Arts for Children in St. Paul. In 2002 she began Expressive Arts for Sisters in Mankato. Since 2005, she has resided at the Good Counsel Convent in Mankato. Sister Miriam holds numerous degrees from Minnesota colleges: a bachelor's in English from the College of St. Catherine in St. Paul; a master's in education from the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul; a master's in biology from St. Mary's College in Winona and a master's in art therapy from the College of St. Benedict in St. Joseph.

A blessing of these years I want to share is ...

The most special blessing of my life was my mother and her dedication to the Blessed Virgin Mary. After the birth of each of her four daughters, Mom took us to church and offered us to the Blessed Mother, to be blessed and cared for by Mary our whole life. Another blessing was to be taught by the SSNDs through my grade school and high school years.

Words of wisdom I would like to share ...
