## **Sister Mary Bryan Owens, SSND**

*Sister Mary Bryan's first teaching assignment in 1959 was as a teacher at Mater Dei High School in Breese, Illinois. After nine years at MDHS, she was assigned to the Academy of Notre Dame in Belleville, Illinois, followed by an assignment to St. Paul High School in Santa Fe Springs, California. In 1974, Sister Mary Bryan returned to Belleville as dean of students at Althoff High School. She then became principal of Notre Dame High School in St. Louis, where she served from January 1977 until 1984. Her ministry of high school administration then continued at St. Francis Borgia through 1995. Similar assignments took her to St. Vincent in Perryville and Gibault High School in Columbia, Illinois. In 2007, Sister Mary Bryan began her current ministry as a part-time English teacher of adult refugees at St. Louis's International Institute. She earned both a bachelor's and master's degree in English from the former Notre Dame College in St. Louis and St. Louis University, respectively.*
