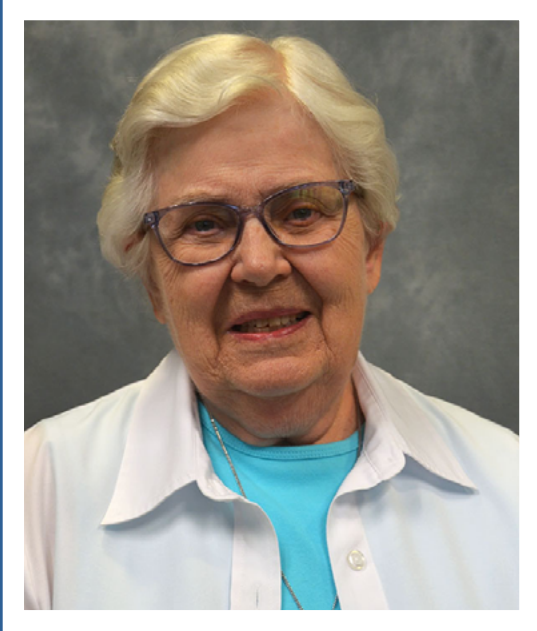

Sister Sharon Rose Terbrock, SSND

First Profession - August 1, 1952 | Celebrating 70 Years



Sister Sharon Rose Terbrock was born in Overland, Missouri, and in 1952 professed first vows in St. Louis. She began her ministry that same year, teaching and serving as organist at St. Bernadette, St. Louis. She remained at St. Bernadette for three years and then taught and served as organist at Immaculate Conception, Marrero, Louisiana, for four years. She served as a teacher and organist for one year at St. Aloysius Gonzaga, St. Louis before receiving a bachelor's degree in history from the former Notre Dame College, St. Louis in 1960. She then served for two years as teacher and organist at Holy Family, Freeburg, Missouri. From 1962 to 1968 Sister Sharon Rose was a teacher, organist and administrator at Sacred Heart, Eureka, Missouri. She then served from 1968 to 1975 as teacher, organist and administrator at Our Lady of Lourdes, Washington, Missouri. During this time she received a master's degree in elementary education administration from St. Louis University, St. Louis. In 1975 Sister Sharon Rose went to California and taught in two schools: Santa Isabel, Los Angeles and Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Indio. After ministering in California for four years, she returned to the Midwest in 1979, teaching and serving as organist at Sacred Heart, DuQuoin, Illinois, until 1984. She was engaged in community service for one year at Notre Dame Hall, St. Louis before serving for four years as administrator and organist at St. Anthony, Sullivan, Missouri. She returned to California in 1989 to serve as assistant superintendent of schools for the Diocese of Fresno. She came back to St. Louis in 1996 where she has remained. She served as assistant local leader
