

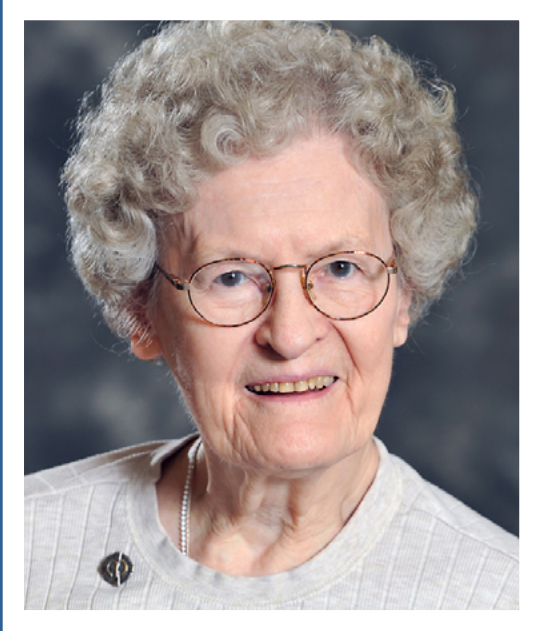

Sister Alice Jeannette Giere, SSND

First Profession - July 31, 1947 | Celebrating 75 Years



Sister Alice Jeannette Giere was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and began her ministry teaching at St. Anne, Milwaukee in 1946. From there, she taught at St. Luke's, Gary, Indiana, and in 1947 made first profession in Milwaukee. She remained at St. Luke's until 1952 and then returned to Wisconsin, teaching at St. Mary, Elm Grove until 1957. That same year, Sister Alice Jeannette earned a bachelor's degree in English from Mount Mary College (now University), Milwaukee. After earning her degree, she began teaching at St. John the Baptist, Marshfield, Wisconsin, where she remained for five years. Beginning in 1962 she taught and served as administrator at Holy Rosary, Darlington, Wisconsin, for three years and then went back to Indiana. For the next seven years, Sister Alice Jeannette served as administrator and teacher at Holy Angels, Gary; SS Peter and Paul, Huntington, and as administrator at Holy Spirit, Fort Wayne. During this time she earned a master's degree in education from Marquette University, Milwaukee. She spent 1972 to 1977 teaching at St. Adalbert, Grand Rapids, Michigan, and 1977 to 1986 teaching in Wisconsin, first for five years at St. Joseph, Appleton, and then serving as administrator for three years at St. Paul, Bloomer. Sister Alice Jeannette spent the next three years in Indiana teaching at SS Peter and Paul, Huntington and serving as administrator at St. Ambrose, Andersen. In

1989 she became a member of the secretarial staff and an administrative assistant at Cardinal

Stritch University, Milwaukee. Starting in the late 1990s she ministered as a volunteer and as a massage therapist at Notre Dame of Elm Grove, Elm Grove, Wisconsin.

She also served as a tutor from 2001 to 2003 for Milwaukee Achiever Literacy Services. Sister Alice Jeannette Giere currently serves in prayer and presence at

Trinity Woods, Milwaukee.
